












On the learning and teaching front, we launched a new short course on media and digital policy, addressing the evolving landscape of media governance. This online course leads to a professional certificate and is an ideal way for working professionals to enhance their knowledge and skills. Our BA Honours students premiered

their short documentaries, showcasing their remarkable storytelling skills. They also published two print publications: a newspaper and an annual magazine, alongside their regular news reports for the SMF online news website.

We engaged in several exciting research projects, continuing initiatives such as the South African leg of the Worlds of Journalism study, the international Information Disorder in the Global South project, and a range of innovative science communication activities hosted by the South African Research Chair in Science Communication. We also launched a new Centre for Information Integrity in Africa, which will coordinate research activities in this area. We are grateful for the generous funding received from Mr. Ton Vosloo to kickstart the Centre's work and address the

challenges of information disorder in the coming years. Our staff participated in several international research visits, presented their work at international conferences, and hosted visiting academics, showcasing our work on global platforms and building international research networks.

A highlight of the year was hosting the annual South African Communication Association conference in September, themed *The Politics of the Present*. Nearly 160 colleagues from across the country, along with several international delegates, gathered to share the latest insights from their research in media, communications, journalism, and cultural studies.

One of the department's key objectives is staying connected

with our community of interest in industry and civil society. To this end, we hosted our annual World Press Freedom Day event in May, focusing on journalism's role in mitigating the environmental crisis.

2024 also marked 30 years of democracy in South Africa, and we held several discussions on this theme throughout the year. Highlights included a panel discussion on cartooning and democracy, featuring cartoonists Jonathan Shapiro (Zapiro), Brandan Reynolds, and Tanzanian cartoonist Gado.

We were also honoured to host Ms. Shamila Batohi, the National Director of Public Prosecutions, for our second partnership lecture with Freedom Under Law. This lecture reflected on the rule of law, the media, and state capture.

We are grateful to the Millennium Trust for supporting these events and other activities.

Our alumni are an essential part of our community—or should I say family—with whom we aim to strengthen ties. In 2024, we welcomed alumni back for a festive reunion event during the Homecoming/Tuiskoms weekend. We plan to make this an annual celebration of the connections across generations of graduates.

SciCom continues to advocate for science and social justice

since joining the Department in 2023, SciCom has continued to work on new and existing projects that advance science communication research. By enhancing the understanding of science in society, SciCom has interlinked various communities through constructive, researchinspired engagement.

SciCom is committed to advancing science communication research. Our goal is to explore the connections between scientific efforts, societal dynamics, and evolving communication methods. By doing so, we aim to gain insights into how science engages with the public and influences societal progress.

These are some of the stories from 2024.

Imidibaniso Exchange

The Imidibaniso Exchange
Workshop is an annual, in-person
media and communications
workshop for scientists that is
held over one day. It provides a
fun, interactive, and enriching

overview of best practices in creative communication that scientists can incorporate into their public engagement strategies for research projects. Since its inception, the Exchange has featured presentations from scientists, public speakers, authors, social media influencers, musicians, and performers. More than 60 scientists and scientific researchers have participated in the Exchange.



Evidence and Power Online Roundtable

SciCom continued its <u>Evidence</u> and <u>Power Online Roundtable</u> in collaboration with Bournemouth University. In the recent Roundtable held in October, the focus was on emancipatory health, specifically examining theories and practices related to health equity and the social determinants of health. Key discussion points

included how we utilise health data to determine the needs of the population, particularly in a country like South Africa, which faces an urgent need to address its healthcare backlog. The Roundtable also raised questions about how to ensure the mental wellbeing of society in an inclusive manner without compromising the health sector. Central to these discussions was the importance of ensuring that data effectively supports our health initiatives, especially in contexts where identity is crucial to allocating adequate resources. Additionally, the role of media and communications in amplifying health issues and promoting health justice within society was emphasized. The Roundtable continues its mission to stimulate insightful discussions on the complex relationship between science, communication, and society.

The Academic Citizen Podcast Season 7

The Academic Citizen has returned with a new season that focuses on the role of sound and its impact on knowledge production and dissemination. In November 2023, the podcast hosted Sound Matters, a virtual symposium in collaboration with the South African Research Chair in Science Communication and the South African Journal of Science.

Researchers interested in the relationship between sound and knowledge gathered to share their work, highlighting how sound serves as a meaningful medium for effectively communicating research when other mediums may fall short. Eight presentations from the symposium were selected and featured on the podcast, which can be heard here.

Publications

SciCom has published five peer-reviewed articles covering a variety of topics. These include a special issue focused on the significance of science communication in social justice efforts, an exploration of the emotional engagement involved in citizen science aimed at mapping solitary bee diversity in

Johannesburg, an examination of the lived experiences of individuals with mental illness, and an investigation into the pressing issue of sewage contamination in the Jukskei River in Johannesburg. All publications can be found here.

FicSci Anthologies

Since the launch of the FicSci Writers Workshop in 2022, two anthologies have been published. The first anthology, titled flow, was released in 2023 and delves into the complexities of fluid mechanics ranging from hair and blood clotting. The second anthology, night_sky, focuses on cuttingedge research covering topics such as X-ray binary stars, extragalactic sources, and the Magellanic Clouds. Both anthologies include poems, essays, scripts, and illustrations that respond to prompts from leading scientists. You can find the anthologies available here.

SciCom Illustration

Following the launch of Humusha in 2023, SciCom commissioned one creative, Max Hodge, to create an illustration that speaks to SciCom's broader commitment to advancing science communication for social justice. The illustration positions the Chair in different perspectives of trying to ensure that there is an interconnected relationship between science,

communication and justice and that society truly benefits from these in their daily lives.

SACOMM SciCom Prize

SciCom was pleased to announce the establishment of a new prize for the annual SACOMM conference. The prize, valued at R5000, is awarded for the best conference paper related to the theme, "science communication for social justice". After a rigorous selection process by the judging committee, the committee selected Chelsea Holland, an independent researcher who researches the slangbos in the Cape Winelands. The winner was announced at the SACOMM Conference on 11 September 2024 in Stellenbosch.

Media tour: Hons students get a taste of SA industry

'hile challenges posed by Covid, saw the BAHons Journalism media tour remain Western Cape-bound over the last couple of years, the class of 2024 was able to visit Gauteng during the June break.

The aim of this year's media tour was two-fold: Students were able to visit a variety of newsrooms and media-related institutions in Johannesburg to broaden their understanding of the current media landscape. Secondly, it afforded students the opportunity of a practical exploration of the South African economy.

In addition to visits to various media institutions. this year's class also visited the Johannesburg Stock Exchange, a Sibanye-Stillwater mine. Eskom's National Control Centre and Lethabo Power Station. The opportunity to go underground in an operational gold mine - to a level of 2km - and to walk to the rock face underground as the

miners do every day, was a unique experience and an opportunity for to students to improve their understanding of mining conditions, labour issues, and the mining sector, in general.

Equally educational, was the opportunity to visit Eskom's National Control Centre, where the national system operator spent the morning having a frank, detailed and engaging conversation with our students, and showing them the control room itself.

Combined with a visit to the Lethabo Power Station, it was an opportunity to engage with the respective teams in those operational room(s) from where extremely dedicated engineers are doing their best to keep South Africa's power grid stable.

Our students returned from Johannesburg with a much better understanding of the various industries and organisations that keep the economic heart of South Africa beating, as well as of the interlinked way in which the economy operates.


The honours students visited Maropeng – The Cradle of Humankind - as part of their Gauteng tour.

Highlights from 2024






