INTRODUCTION

Our Centre's societal impact efforts are intimately tied to what we value as an institute: pioneering health research, collaborating and connecting, driving excellence in science and catalysing positive change in the health of our nation. We strive to achieve the National Development Plan 2030 goals and contribute towards the United Nation Sustainable Development Goals (SGDs) 3 (ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages), 4 (ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all) and 5 (achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls).

In response to the social restrictions imposed in light of the Covid-19 pandemic, the CTR made every effort to adapt our public engagement strategy to ensure active engagement with key stakeholders during the reporting period. While many community outreach activities had to be cancelled for safety reasons, our team rose to the challenge to create informative and engaging online content for wide-spread dissemination.

A summary of the societal impact activities of the CTR for 2020 organised into four categories according to the type of engagement strategy utilized, namely science communication, community engagement initiatives, public awareness events and social outreach activities, are listed below.

PART A: SCIENCE COMMUNICATION

Activities within this category include media interviews (journalist interviews, radio interviews, TV appearances, podcast appearances and social media live streaming events), popular science pieces (press releases, evidence briefs, e- or printed newspaper articles and opinion pieces, blog posts, websites and newsletters) and educational presentations (formal seminars, round table discussions, feedback meetings with key stakeholders, academic meetings with scientific peers and science-related workshops with non-scientific target audiences) that translate the research findings of the CTR into a format accessible to the general public, including policymakers.

Media interviews are an effective means of mass communication, providing news to people throughout the country, with the ability to reach across borders, engaging a wider audience as opposed to public events. Radio interviews are of significant value in countries such as South Africa to ensure access to rural communities that lack access to basic amenities such as electricity and thus rely on a battery-powered radio for news and entertainment. To engage a more youthful audience, the CTR invests considerable time in social media and social media live streaming events. Reaching the youth through platforms they engage on, providing credible information where reliable news is scarce is a driving force behind the CTR's social media engagements.

Popular Science pieces strive to inform non-specialist audiences about new scientific insights and discoveries in a format that is more accessible and easier to understand. Like media interviews, popular science articles are a great way to help a wider audience understand scientific concepts. Educational Presentations provide excellent opportunities for personal interaction with the attendees through question-and-answer sessions and debate difference, which traditional media engagement does not cater for. These events have provided an opportunity for networking and initiating collaborations with community leaders, such as business leaders, policymakers and influential community members, that have further facilitated knowledge transfer and the engagement of hard-to-reach populations.

To support these efforts, our Centre invests time and resources in the training of our staff and students in the art of science communication. On 2nd June, ten researchers from the CTR took part in an online writing workshop hosted by The Conversation Africa. During this session, the importance of science communication in terms of “why it matters” was covered. On 18th August, ten postdoctoral research fellows from the CTR attended #tHEARTofResearch popular writing hosted by Science communication experts from Jive Media Africa. This training workshop aimed to guide scientists in harnessing the power of storytelling to increase the visibility and impact of their work by developing skills for engaging the public with that research. At the end of this workshop, each researcher produced a 250-300 word popular science piece outlining their research for submission to The Conversation Africa for publication.

PART B: COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVES

Community engagement activities include projects/initiatives at a grassroots level that facilitate active engagement between researchers and the community through open dialogue and hands-on activities.

This interaction provides an opportunity for communities to learn more about who the CTR in terms of our vision, mission and core objectives, which is important for bridging the divide between science and society. Furthermore, these initiatives ensure mutual benefit to all participating parties through two-way learning, rather than the traditional top-down approach used in lectures, where the target audience is presumed to have a knowledge deficit and the purpose of this engagement is to educate them on a particular topic.

These activities aim to advance knowledge and/or change behaviour by employing an evidence-based methodology that has been shown to promote meaningful engagement that results in a measurable impact on health-promoting practices. In addition, they aim to build rapport with targeted population groups and increase trust and support in research. This is achieved through the establishment of community partnerships and regular engagement with key stakeholders to build relationships, creating a network of supporters to help promote our engagement efforts.

An outline of our Centre's community engagement efforts, together with a brief description and a link to accompanying resources and media, for the reporting period is listed below.

2020 MBHG Hip Hop TB Initiative

The MBHG Hip Hop TB intervention, hosted by the CTR in partnership with Jive Media Africa, Hip Hop U and Science Spaza at Cedar High School of The Arts in Michelle's Plain, was a unique community engagement project that enabled scientists from our institution to engage with learners from Cedar High around the topic of Tuberculosis.

During this 4-day initiative, scientists highlighted TB as a health epidemic within the local community, and emphasised the research efforts of the CTR to combat this disease with the overall aim to raise TB awareness and inspire youth to pursue a career in science. This initiative promoted engagement and learning in science through the popular mediums of rap, hip hop and music. The placement of science within a popular culture space provides an opportunity for it to be owned by young people – rather than remaining foreign and inaccessible. At the end of this programme, the learners conceptualised, produced and performed 5 original rap and hip-hop songs conveying key messages about TB that they felt were important for the community to know based on their interaction with our staff and students. A [press article and short video](#) outlining the #MBHGHipHop TB intervention was released on 20 April 2020. The 5 original rap/hip-hop songs (which are available on [SoundCloud](#)) originating from the #MBHGHipHop TB intervention were highlighted by Jive Media at the International Music Therapy Conference on 7th and 8th July as well as in a series of social media posts leading up to and during the event. These tracked have been combined with researcher interviews involving several staff and students within the CTR and are set to be released in March 2021 for World TB Day to feature on several radio stations throughout South Africa as a means of raising TB awareness and highlight the research being conducted within the CTR.

PART C: PUBLIC AWARENESS EVENTS

Public awareness events target a large number of people over a specific period to generate public recognition of a particular issue/topic and achieve specific outcomes or pre-determined goals. Examples of such activities include information stalls, distribution of pamphlets, open days and science café's aimed at increasing awareness regarding the CTR's research, opportunities available within our centre and disease awareness.

Through public awareness campaigns communities are empowered with knowledge regarding local health issues. These campaigns also serve to promote opportunities available to the community that they may otherwise be unaware of, such as postgraduate training prospects and community-targeted programmes. Therefore, these events provide an opportunity to create a public "face" for the CTR and are great places interact with the community to help members remember who we are and encourage them to visit websites/social profiles to learn more. These engagements also provide an opportunity to inspire the youth to pursue a career in the medical field.

PART D: SOCIAL OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

Social outreach activities affect the well-being of the community, which include providing services to neglected communities. The overarching goal of community outreach projects includes bringing the CTR and members of the communities served together.

Activities that facilitate this include participation in local events to engage local communities and understand the issues that affect them the most to build a strong relationship and partnerships. By doing so, communities begin to view

the CTR as a partner that will be there for the long term with their concerns in mind and will result in support of the CTRs efforts by the same community in the future.

Importantly, community involvement provides an opportunity for both researchers and locals to support community issues that may have no direct impact on the strategic goals or objectives of the Centre. Participation in these activities is key to maintaining ongoing visibility in communities and serves as a testament that the CTR is not solely focused on issues that benefit the Centre but rather prioritising the needs/interests of the community at large, positioning the Centre in good standing with the public.

Noteworthy, the CTR took a proactive approach regarding its social outreach efforts in light of the devastating effects of the Covid-19 pandemic on local communities by funding various social outreach projects to support frontline workers and provide relief to local businesses and historically disadvantaged communities, as well as volunteering our time to help in the fight against Covid-19.

15-04-20	Covid-19 PPE donation	To assist healthcare professionals in the fight against Covid-19, our Centre has donated ten powered air-purifying respirators (PAPRs) to the value of R30 000.00 and loaned three accompanying battery packs to Tygerberg Hospital to ensure staff safety when performing high-risk procedures, such as intubation in which aerosols are generated putting them at great risk of infection. This means that at any time, of the ten healthcare workers issued PAPRs, three can engage with COVID-19 positive patients simultaneously to perform life-saving high-risk procedures. The PAPR filters the air supplied to the hood through HEPA filters to remove all infectious particles and prevent infection. These units

		can be cleaned and disinfected to allow for reuse by the user, alleviating the burden of personal protective equipment (PPE) shortage in the workplace. This is just one of the many ways in which the academic and clinical state sectors are working together during this pandemic to ensure the well-being of our country.
2020	CrowdFight Covid-19 initiative	#CrowdFightCovid19 is an initiative from the scientific community to put all available resources at the service of #COVID-19 research. How does it work? A small group of coordinators receive requests from COVID-19 researchers and identify other scientists (that's us!) who can fulfil those requests.
2020	Stellenbosch University/DOH volunteer programme	This programme aims to assist the Tygerberg Covid-19 tracing Pod of the Department of Health with case contact tracing by providing the man-power needed to organize contact tracing data and trace daily. Excitingly, this project has evolved into a sustainable partnership with Valota Farms to provide a token of thanks in the form of food parcels to our research study participants.
