12 Months

- •Attend the NIH Workshop: "Writing a successful NIH Application"
- Explore what types of projects NIH is funding in your area of science and search for a funding opportunity. Generate preliminary data.

6 Months

• Find experienced NIH grantee collaborators with skills that complement your own to improve the strength of your proposal. Make use of NIH RePORTER. Study Notices of Funding Opportunity Announcements (NOFO) and start planning your application. Assemble a reliable team. Decide on Key Personnel. Start writing!

4 Months

Conduct an organizational assessment. Figure out what resources and support are available and what additional support you will need for your project. Get advice from <u>GMO</u> on developing your application.

2 Months

Inform GMO ASAP but not **later than 60 days** before the due date of your plan to apply for NIH Funding. Get advice from GMO on developing your application, especially the budget and requirements for other documents

1 Months

Submit: completed biosketches, Key personnel Information, signed Financial Conflict of Interest (FCOI) declarations to GMO. Complete the NIH and SU FCOI training. No application can be submitted without these documents

3 Weeks

Ask experts in your field as well as experts not in the field to review the scientific documents.

Finalise the budget and justifications for all periods

2 Weeks

Submit:

Letters of Support with an index

Sub-contract documents e.g. Institutional contract letters to GMO.

1 Week

Submit:

All outstanding final documents to GMO

2 Days

Plan for technical review of final application and any technical failures. **Submit** 2 days before the final due date to ensure timeous, error free submission.

Mission


The mission of the Research Ethics Commitee: Animal Care and Use (REC:ACU) is to ensure the humane care and use of animals in research, teaching and testing and to ensure compliance with the South African National Standard for the care and use of animals for scientific purposes 10386:2021 and applicable regulations (Section 23 (c) of the Veterinary and Para-veterinary professions Act 19 of 1982 and Section 20 of the Animal Health Act of 2002.)

Vision

The REC:ACU must review and approve any activities that involve the use of live vertebrate animals (as defined by the SANS 10386).

Specific examples of such activities and/or uses are:

- Research (wildlife, laboratory animals, farm animals and aquaculture)
- Teaching (practical session)
- Testing (antibody, vaccine etc.)





The 4R's

Replacement of so-called 'sentient' animals wherever possible, with 'non-sentient' research models or systems in order to eliminate the use of animals that can experience unpleasant sensations.

Reduction of the number of animals in experiments by designing strategies that facilitate the use of the smallest number that will allow valid information to be obtained from the study.


Refinement of animal sourcing, animal care practices and experimental procedure to eliminate physical and psychological distress within the limitations imposed by the objectives of the research.

Responsibility to act in accordance with the highest research standards and humane care and respect for animals used for scientific purposes and to accept accountability for our actions.

The 5 Freedoms

Freedom from hunger and thirst
Freedom from pain, injury and disease
Freedom from distress
Freedom from discomfort

Freedom to express behaviours that promote well-being

DO I NEED ETHICS CLEARANCE FROM MORE THAN ONE COMMITTEE FOR MY STUDY?

Generally, research projects are submitted to a single REC. However, there are instances where, for example, health research projects may need to obtain ethics clearance from both HREC and REC: BES where biological samples are taken for analysis. Similarly, certain studies would need approval by both REC: ACU and REC: BES, or both REC: SBER and REC: ACU.

Please feel free to discuss your project with a representative of the REC to determine whether approval by another REC might be required and to not delay the process of obtaining ethics approval.

WHAT IS THE MANDATE OF EACH REC?

Research Ethics Committees at SU have distinct mandates for the review of ethics considerations in research, & are constituted in terms of legislation and regulations, and in compliance with national and international ethics guidelines.

REC: ACU

is mandated to review research and teaching activities that involve the use of live, non-human vertebrates and higher invertebrates such as advanced members of the Cephalopoda and Decapoda, including eggs, foetuses and embryos (where development of an integrated nervous system is evident).



reviews research that is potentially hazardous to humans, animals, or the environment (such research that may involve work related to recombinant DNA, pathogens and infectious agents, biological toxins or engineered nanomaterials).



(and sub-committee Undergraduate Research (UREC)) review research protocols to ensure compliance in the protection of human participant safety, rights, and welfare in health research. UREC is responsible for ethics review of research undertaken by undergraduate and Honours students whilst HREC manages submissions from postgraduate students and staff.



reviews research that involve human participation in social science, behavioural, economic and education disciplines.

The RECs each have different application forms that are designed to obtain the specific information that the relevant committee must review and report on, so your application cannot simply be rerouted

PAYMENT OF RESEARCH PARTICIPANTS



1

TIME

- Research participants should be compensated appropriately for their time.
- Participants should be paid at rates commensurate with unskilled labour.
- Payment is for what the 'work' of research participation is worth, and not what the participants' actual time is worth.
- Participants should be paid whether they are employed or not.
- Investigators should estimate the amount of time participants will spend engaged in research activities for each research visit.

INCONVENIENCE

- Research participants may be compensated for inconvenience.
- Over and above "time" payment, participants should be paid for procedures that may cause inconvenience or discomfort.
- Payment amount should reasonably reflect the extent of the inconvenience e.g. the inconvenience attached to answering a simple questionnaire may be lower than a blood draw.
- Investigators should judge whether participants will undergo certain uncomfortable/inconvenient procedures at select trial visits.

EXPENSES

- Research participants should be reimbursed for their expenses.
- Direct costs incurred by participants should be reimbursed.
- The cost of participants being away from their place of work should not be considered.
- Investigators should consult community representatives about appropriate amounts.



Research Funding

FMHS Research Committee background

Senate approved that research committees be formed in environments within Stellenbosch University (SU) and be decentralised. The Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences (FMHS) formed the FMHS Research Committee (formerly named Subcommittee C of the Research Committee of Senate), which fulfills the following main functions:

- Attending to the research agenda of the FMHS
- Advising the SU Research Committee concerning research policy
- Internal screening and recommendation of NRF rating applications
- Allocation of internal research funding

The committee consists of around thirty members, representative of all departments and research support environments within the FMHS.

Chair: Prof Nico C Gey van Pittius Secretariat: Dr Tania Brodovcky

The overarching Stellenbosch University Research Committee advises Senate on research policy and the advancement of research at SU.

Research funding opportunities within the FMHS

RESEARCH ASSISTANCE & TEMPORARY RESEARCH ASSISTANCE FUND

One- to four-year contract positions are made available to senior staff for assistance with research projects within the Faculty.

Closing date: September

LECTURER REPLACEMENT FUND

This opportunity is earmarked for lecturing staff within the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences to alleviate part of their lecturing load for the advancement of their research.

Closing date: March

FARLY CARFER RESEARCH FUND

This funding is to enable early-career researchers to embark on a research project that would lead to the production of research outputs, which would enable them to apply for national or international grants.

Closing date: March

POSTDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS

Co-funding is made available in support of postdoctoral fellowships, at R220,000 each, and awarded competitively to hosts, who should recruit suitable candidates who obtained their PhD degrees within the past 5 years. Closing date: September

HARRY CROSSLEY FOUNDATION FUNDING

This funding is earmarked to support research project running costs for postgraduate students and postdoctoral fellows, who should be the applicants.

Closing date: May

FACULTY OF MEDICINE AND HEALTH SCIENCES OPEN ACCESS PUBLICATION FUND (FMHS-OAF)

Funding of up to R30.000 is provided to support payment of article processing charges (APC) for publications in peer-reviewed Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET)-accredited open access or hybrid journals. It is earmarked for early-career researchers, postdoctoral fellows, or postgraduate students who should be the first authors of manuscripts. Closing date: Ad hoc. but by 5 December each year

SCIENTIFIC TRAVEL & PUBLICATION AWARD **FUNDS**

Scientific travel funding support is provided towards national or international conferences, or short researchrelated visits and/or courses if criteria are met. Publication awards are made to incentivise publication of research results in Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET)-accredited peer-reviewed journals. Closing dates: 1 March, 1 July, or 1 November (depending on period of travel)

SPECIAL SUPPORT SCHEME FOR RESEARCH (SOS-FUNDS)

A fixed amount is allocated annually for each publication unit earned for journal articles, books or book chapters and patents which qualify for a government subsidy from the Department of Higher Education and Training. This amount is paid into a central research account of each department / institute / centre / unit. The funds are made available by the head to the researchers who have contributed to the publication units.

(1) Undergraduate research funding

The Undergraduate Research Fund is a newly established fund in the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences (FMHS), dedicated to supporting undergraduate research in the Faculty.

Eligibility: Undergraduate and Honours students registered in the FMHS.

(2) Research assistance funding

The FMHS Research Committee provides co-funding towards a full time contract position for a <u>research assistant</u> to enable a senior FMHS staff member (e.g. a principal investigator, departmental chair, senior academic or senior clinician) to ensure accelerated production of high quality research outputs.

(3) Temporary research assistance funding

The FMHS Research Committee provides part-time (temporary) positions for <u>research assistance</u> to enable a senior FMHS staff member (e.g. a principal investigator, departmental chair, senior academic or senior clinician) to fast-track a research project and produce high quality research outputs. The nature of the research assistance may be *e.g.* a research assistant, data capturer, field nurse, field worker, translator, etc.

Eligibility: Full time FMHS academic/research/clinical staff



Information for registrar research projects

Dear Registrar,

In 2010, the HPCSA defined new requirements for specialist registration, which included the need for registrars to demonstrate research competence by completing a research project. Doing research requires that you design, execute and write-up (and hopefully publish!) a research project. As a postgraduate student, you are expected to create your own work structure, find and manage resources, consult regularly with your research supervisors, and seek out opportunities (listed below) to develop your research skills.

The faculty requirements for the research component include the completion and approval of a research protocol. Candidates can begin data collection only once ethics approval has been obtained. This should be the focus of your research energies during your first year. Keep in mind that the research process is time-consuming, so we encourage you to get started with your research as soon as possible. Time management will be one of your biggest challenges as a registrar.

Registrar Research Support Office (RRSO): Dr Emmanuel Obasa (<u>obasa@sun.ac.za</u>) is the head of the RRSO which is fully dedicated to providing research support for registrars and their supervisors. Familiarise yourself with the <u>RRSO webpage</u> which provides a wealth of resources and information about research consultations, workshops and short courses.

One of the most valuable courses for registrars is the <u>Clinical Research Protocol Writing course</u> which is offered by the RRSO in collaboration with the Research Capacity Development and Funding Office. This is a 16-week course that is run mostly online with 5 contact sessions interspersed throughout. The course provides everything registrars need to know about writing a protocol and includes content on choosing a research question, different study designs, basic biostatistics, ethical considerations and research timelines and budgets. Participants are encouraged to develop their own draft protocol by the end of the course.

The <u>Clinical Research Manuscript Writing course</u> was launched in 2021. This six-part webinar series walks participants through the process of writing up a quantitative clinical research manuscript that would be suitable for publication.

Research Capacity Development and Funding Office (RCFO): Dr Tania Brodovcky (taniab@sun.ac.za) is the head of the Research Capacity Development and Funding Office which offers several workshops, short courses and short information sessions for all researchers in the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences. You can also view podcasts from previous sessions. As mentioned previously, the RCFO hosts the Clinical Research Protocol Writing course in collaboration with the RRSO.

The Health Research Ethics Committee (HREC): All health-related research requires ethical approval. This is done via an online application process to the Health Research Ethics Committee of the Faculty. An invaluable resource to keep on hand is the Standard Operating Procedure which provides a wealth of information to guide the development of your protocol. Submission to HREC can be done only once the protocol has been signed off by your HOD. Please familiarize yourself with the administrative process for registrar research in your respective department. This video provides a walk-through on how to submit an online ethics application.



Information for registrar research projects

Undergraduate Research Office (URO): Ms Inge Sonn (ingeks@sun.ac.za) has curated several valuable resources on the Roadmap to Research. These resources provide a good introduction to the research process for novice researchers.

Centre for Evidence-Based Health: You can request assistance from a biostatistician by making an <u>online booking</u> for an appointment. The centre also hosts a monthly <u>Biostatistics Clinic</u>. There is no need to make a booking for this – researchers can simply drop in for a short consultation.

Writing support provided by the Language Centre: The Writing Lab at the <u>SU Language Centre</u> offers writing consultations and several workshops aimed at improving academic writing. Although consultations are free, workshops will be at your own cost.

Electronic access to university resources: You would have been given a Stellenbosch University username and temporary password (collectively referred to as your SUNID) by the admissions office. You will often need to use your SUNID to access resources via the Stellenbosch University website so do keep this on hand.

IT helpdesk: For problems regarding access to the university websites and other IT-related difficulties, you can contact the <u>Stellenbosch University IT helpdesk</u> between 8:00 and 16:30 on Mondays to Fridays at 021 808 4367 or at help@sun.ac.za.

Access to the library: You can access the library website here. After logging in with your SUNID, you can access a wide range of electronic databases, e-journals and e-books. Click here to watch a presentation on how to use the online library. The library's <a href="mailto:step-by-step-guide"/step-by-step-guide"/step-by-step-guide useful information for conducting a literature review. The library also has a step-by-step guide explaining the research process, as well as guide on referencing. The library offers several training programs for researchers. Keep an eye on their website for more information. This site provides you with a list of common databases for interdisciplinary health sciences, tips for literature searching and keeping up to date with research publications. If you require assistance or have any questions, please visit the information desk, where the librarian on duty will be able to help. Note that you will need a student card to borrow hardcopy resources from the library.

Managing your references: You will be engaging with lots of academic material, and it can be challenging to keep a record of everything. We encourage you to use the Mendeley referencing manager. The library's Mendeley support page will provide you with relevant information. This video will also help you get started. If you would prefer not to use a referencing manager, keep in mind that you will need to keep excellent records of your material and generate manual reference lists.

Funding opportunities: There are several <u>funding opportunities</u> available, such as awards made by the Harry Crossley Foundation. These might be useful if you require funds to conduct your research.

Enhancing Postgraduate Environments: Stellenbosch University has partnered with the <u>Enhancing</u> Postgraduate Environments website which offers a treasure trove of online learning materials.

Good luck for your research journey! We hope it will be an enriching and rewarding experience.




Generic examination procedure for MMed research assignments



 - The HOD will forward these documents and a cover letter to the Vice-Dean of Learning and Teaching
 - The HOD will receive an approval letter
 - The HOD will "sign off" the dissertation

- Candidates are advised to <u>submit their dissertations at least 3</u> months before exam registrations open
- Make sure your supervisor(s) have final copies of the following:

 - 3. Digital dataset and any hard copies of data
