
## Credits

## Global Learning Outcomes

The Department of Modern Foreign Languages through its evening course offering aligns itself (where applicable) with the updated Global Learning Outcomes (2024). The courses often take place in small groups to allow for as much interaction amongst lecturers and students as possible. The structure of the classes also promotes positive interaction amongst local students and international students to ensure a collaborative environment of cultural exchange.

As such, the foreign language evening courses aim:

- \* to allow students to critically reflect on their own cultural, social and educational frames of reference.

In a modern foreign language classroom, students do not approach the target language as neutral learners; each student brings with them culturally shaped assumptions about communication, politeness, authority, learning styles, and “correctness.” Encouraging critical reflection helps students recognise that their linguistic interpretations are informed—and sometimes constrained—by their own cultural and educational backgrounds.

- \* to demonstrate respect for diversity by adopting pluriversal perspectives inside the classroom.

A pluriversal approach recognises that there is no single “target culture.” Modern languages are spoken across multiple regions, communities, and identities, each with its own norms and realities. By foregrounding this diversity, the classroom becomes a space where multiple voices and experiences are legitimised.

- \* to allow for the development of professional skills and competencies in intercultural settings.

Foreign language classrooms are ideal environments for developing transferable professional skills required in international and multicultural workplaces. Language learning inherently involves negotiation of meaning, adaptability, and sensitivity to context. These skills are also refined through the interpersonal interactions that form a integral part of foreign language learning.

- \* to motivate a continuous development and application of students’ global learning across multiple contexts.

Global learning extends beyond the course itself, encouraging students to apply their skills across academic, social, and professional domains. The goal is to cultivate lifelong learners who view language as a tool for ongoing global engagement.

### Specific outcomes

At the end of the semester the learner should be able to:

- talk about himself/herself, his/her life and surroundings, the weather, likes and dislikes and other basic conversational topics;
- read basic texts in pinyin and recognize basic texts in characters;
- type or write a short friendly letter or email;
- understand and react to a very basic conversation in Chinese;
- listen to Chinese songs and other simple recordings;
- write basic Chinese characters for daily use.

**Please Note:** A minimum of **5 students (international AND local)** is preferred to offer this course. If not, SU International and MFL have the right to not present at all.
