COURSE ADMISSION PROCEDURE AT STELLENBOSH UNIVERSITY

Your course selections are manually processed and evaluated to ensure you have a sufficient number of approved options to choose from when registering after arrival. The course admission process consists of three key phases:

APPLICATION **PHASE**

- All course applications are submitted online as part of your initial application.
- · Be sure to list all the courses you are interested in during this first phase.
- A second course application window may be opened at a later stage, based on a date determined by the SU programme coordinator.

REGISTRATION

Course registration takes place after arrival, during compulsory orientation week. You will:

- Submit a Final Course Registration Form listing your final course choices.
- No course changes may be made after the registration deadline, as set out by SU and University policy.
- Failure to deregister from a course by the deadline may result in a Fail on your academic transcript if the course is left incomplete.



Credit Guidelines

Students may register for a maximum of:

- 60 SU credits per semester
- Equivalent to 30 ECTS or 15 U.S. credits

Mainstream Courses at Stellenbosch University

Undergraduate Courses

Most undergraduate degree programmes at SU run over three years. Semester students can apply for:

- First-year level courses, which are open to all applicants
- Second- and third-year courses, provided relevant prerequisites are met

If no prerequisites are listed, students are encouraged to apply for both higher- and lower-level courses to increase their chances of admission.

Course Levels

Each course has a three-digit module code:

- 1XX = First year
- 2XX = Second year • 3XX = Third (final) year
